A Talk by **Robert Meakings**,
Collections & House Officer at Killerton House.



In his talk, **Robert** will give a brief overview of the history of the Acland family through four hundred years of portraits. Killerton is fortunate to have three examples of work by Sir Joshua Reynolds, including his painting of Sir Thomas Dyke Acland, 7th Baronet of Columbjohn who in 1767 became a reluctant MP for a second time. The Killerton collection also contains a miniature of Sir Thomas Dyke Acland, 9th Baronet of Columbjohn by Samuel Shelley.

ACOUSTIC PROBLEMS AT MONTHLY MEETINGS

Neither solution has proved successful, so various electronic solutions and technical advice has been considered, again without identifying an effective solution. However, the Committee wishes to assure members that this issue remains a high priority and indeed the Mint Methodist Church is keen to continue to work with us to find a solution.

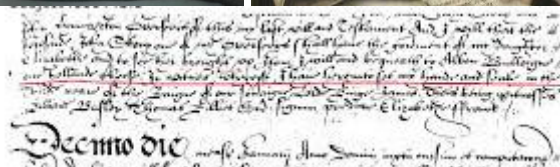

WILLS AS WINDOWS ONTO PAST LIVES IN TUDOR AND STUART ENGLAND

A talk by Dr Laura Sangha, Associate Professor in Early Modern History

Many people are aware that wills can be used to trace family history, but what else can they tell us about the lives of people in the past? In her talk **Laura Sangha** explores some of the lesser known aspects of historic wills, explaining how historians use them to explore a range of topics from religious belief, to gender, to changing patterns of consumption. Particular focus will be on the possessions bequeathed in wills: clothes, furniture, kitchenware, jewellery and much more. These objects give us a practical insight into peoples' lives, reveal the emotions and social rituals around dying, and help us to trace and understand human relationships of the past.

UNIVERSITY LIAISON REPORT

UNEARTHING KILLERTON

In December, Dr Susan Greaney, Lecturer in Archaeology at the University of Exeter, spoke to a large group (probably the largest ever) of our members.

She spoke about leading a field-school (an unusual collective noun) of student archaeologists, having been asked by the National Trust at Killerton to search for the house which was the home of the Acland family, or at least the Killerton branch of it, at Columbjohn.

Dr Greaney described the laying out of five trenches in the area believed to contain the old house. The first trench was scuppered when a large, live electric cable was unearthed, which could not be isolated. Apart from a lot of rubble that might have come from the demolition of the house around 1680, three of the other trenches offered little help with the primary goal.

In trench three, however, they struck, if not gold, cobbles. In fact they found a cobbled floor and then two substantial walls which were almost certainly part of the house they were looking for. Rather than trying to describe the finds myself, **I refer you to the first part of episode 6 of the latest *Digging for Britain*, currently available on iPlayer - <https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/m0026r19>**

We understand that there are plans to continue the dig in early summer 2025.

For those interested in finding out more of the background, I can recommend *A Devon Family: The Story of the Aclands and Killerton* both by (Lady) Anna Acland and available(-ish) at Exeter Library.

The talk, which told us something of how Archaeology is taught and learnt at the university, was very well received by our audience and was followed by an interesting question and answer session. *Dave Parsons*

JOINING A GROUP: members should always contact the convenor before attending a group for the first time.

Policy on Taster Sessions for Non-Members: Non-members of [Exeter u3a](#) who might like to 'try' a group before registering with us, can now attend **two groups**, either **two meetings of one group or one meeting of two different groups**. The Convenor must be contacted before attending and 'visitor' marked against the non-member's name. 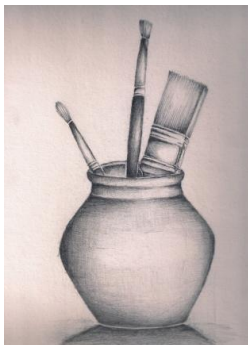
Groups Meeting In Members' Homes: Please remember that it is customary to make a contribution to the host in respect of refreshments.

Car Sharing Policy: The following practice is recommended: the **trip organiser** is responsible for informing group members of **the total estimated fuel cost for the journey, outward and return**. Each car group should then divide this total cost by **the number of passengers plus the driver** and each person should pay this sum.

Risk Assessment Advice: **Individual members are responsible for their own safety.** Make sure you are aware of, and take into account, any warnings about risks like steep steps or uneven paths and advice about appropriate footwear or clothing. Group convenors will be responsible for advising members if a site is not suitable for those with mobility problems.

GROUPS STARTING

Drawing For Everyone: This new group takes place on the **first Tuesday** most months in **the Martin Luther King Room, the Mint, from 2.30 p.m. - 3.45 p.m.**, meeting beforehand for coffee if you wish. We



are drawing, *not* painting, although the use of colour is fine: there is a range of possibilities available in art shops. Please bring your own paper and materials. Just starting out, a pad and a few B pencils and an eraser are enough to get you going. Despite the name, the group is not aimed at people with professional /wide experience, or technical expertise. It's just for members to put pencil/pen to paper in the company of others.

The subjects will mainly be still life, or sometimes each other's heads or hands perhaps for a change! Drawing is good for our powers of observation. It requires us to look carefully, and be true to what we can *actually* see, as opposed to what we think or expect we should be seeing.

Rewe to Poltimore, Broadclyst , Pinhoe and Whipton.



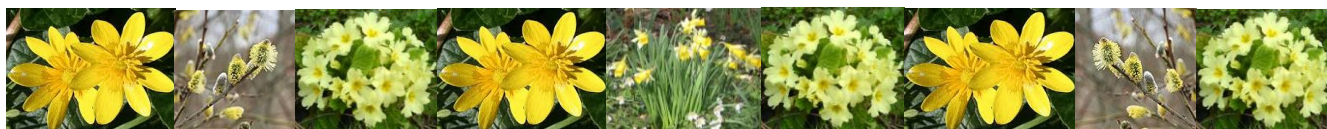

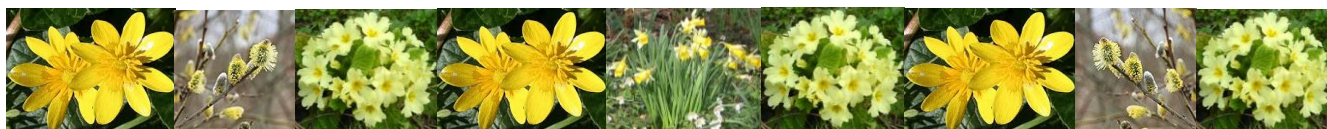
STOP PRESS:

History on the Move: On 16th January the group had another excellent and very popular lecture by Professor David Moss. In his refined, reflective, and well-paced talk, our speaker delved into the ins and outs of his vast subject, *The Poor since 1558 and in Modern Times*. Definitions and solutions to the problem of relief for the poor have occupied philosophers, writers, and politicians throughout history. Debate still rages regarding the able bodied or labouring poor, and the helpless, the physical inefficient, and the rogue/vagabond categories. The question was posed, "Are we any closer to finding an answer today or even further away?" There were fascinating insights of the draconian laws of the 18th century. Also, the stress caused by the Dissolution and then The Reformation. Clamour about how to cope with the dispossessed really took off back then in the mid-16th century. The talk ended with discussion of the poverty today with the focus on relative poverty and what is needed to participate in society.
